Getting Started

Dealing with Diagnosis



Getting a diagnosis of ovarian cancer is not easy. You may have waited months before an accurate diagnosis was made. You may have been in surgery just days after hearing the news. Whatever your situation, it is a traumatic event. A journey of physical, mental and emotional healing must be undertaken, which is best done with support, patience and love.

WHAT TO DO

If you or your loved one has been diagnosed with ovarian cancer, we at COCA suggest three things:

- Find a gynecologic oncologist
- Join a support group
- Stay informed about treatments and clinical trials as you are able

We feel it is important that you work with a *gynecologic oncologist*, not just a gynecologist. A gynecologic oncologist has experience with ovarian cancer surgery and is well-informed about specific chemotherapy treatments.

We suggest you *join an ovarian cancer support group* where you can share information and support with other women. As far as we know, Nicki's Circle Ovarian Cancer Support Groups are the only ovarian cancer groups available in Colorado. If you live outside of the Denver area, we suggest you join our Tele-Support group which meets on the first Wednesday evening of each month. See page 18 for more information on Nicki's Circle.

There is a lot of information available about ovarian cancer on the web. We suggest staying informed to the extent you are able, without becoming overwhelmed. We advise you take the information you find to your doctor's visits with you, to discuss with him/her. However, if you get depressed or overwhelmed with all of the statistics and details you read, moderate your exposure.

10 TIPS TO GUIDE YOU AT THE OUTSET . . .

- 1) See a Gynecologic Oncologist.
- 2) Work with doctors you can talk to and trust.
- 3) It's okay to get a second opinion.
- 4) Write down questions before appointments.
- 5) Bring a friend to appointments to take notes.
- 6) Consider a tumor assay at surgery.
- 7) Get household assistance after surgery.
- 8) Build a team of healthcare professionals.
- 9) Utilize complementary therapies.
- 10) Join a support group.

Why a Gynecologic Oncologist?

Gynecologic Oncologists are specially trained in surgical methods that ensure an optimal "de-bulking" of ovarian cancer. They spend extra time in surgery clearing as much tumor material as possible. Surgeons in other specialties do not have the same training and may not carry out a complete de-bulking. In addition, gyn oncologists stay current with the latest chemotherapies being used against ovarian cancer.

According to the Society of Gynecologic Oncology (SGO):

"The gynecologic oncologist serves as the captain of a woman's gynecologic cancer care team. It is important to consult with a gynecologic oncologist before treatment is started so that the best treatment regimen is chosen for you."

Medical Oncology


A medical oncologist is:
"A doctor who specializes in diagnosing and treating cancer using chemotherapy, hormonal therapy, biological therapy, and targeted therapy. A medical oncologist often is the main health care provider for someone who has cancer. A medical oncologist also gives supportive care and may coordinate treatment given by other specialists."

Ovarian Cancer Facts

Ovarian Cancer Staging



Ovarian cancer staging is determined by your doctor at the time of surgery. The different stages describe the level of tumor cell involvement and how widespread the cancer is. Women with ovarian cancer are frequently diagnosed at Stage IIIC. This is because the symptoms of ovarian cancer are often ignored or misdiagnosed until urgent issues arise.

cludes extension to capsule of liver/spleen.

Stage IIIC

Macroscopic, extrapelvic, peritoneal metastasis (>) greater than 2 cm ± positive retroperitoneal lymph nodes. Includes extension to capsule of liver/spleen.

THE STAGES OF OVARIAN CANCER

From the:

International Federation of Obstetricians and Gynaecologists (FIGO) Ovarian Cancer Staging - Effective January 1, 2014

"Stage I

Tumor confined to ovaries.

Stage IA

Tumor limited to 1 ovary, capsule intact, no tumor on surface, negative washings.

Stage IB

Tumor involves both ovaries otherwise like IA.

Stage IC

The tumour is limited to one or both ovaries: IC1 - Surgical spill; IC2 - Capsule rupture before surgery or tumor on ovarian surface; IC3 - Malignant cells in the ascites or peritoneal washings.

Stage IV

Distant metastasis excluding peritoneal metastasis.

Stage IVA

Pleural effusion with positive cytology.

Stage IVB

Hepatic and/or splenic parenchymal metastasis, metastasis to extra-abdominal organs (including inguinal lymph nodes and lymph nodes outside of the abdominal cavity).

Other major recommendations are as follows:

- Histologic type including grading should be designated at staging.
- Primary site (ovary, Fallopian tube or peritoneum) should be designated where possible.
- Tumors that may otherwise qualify for stage I but involved with dense adhesions justify upgrading to stage II if tumor cells are histologically proven to be present in the adhesions."

Stage II

Tumour involves 1 or both ovaries with pelvic extension (below pelvic brim) or primary peritoneal cancer.

Stage IIA

Extension and/or implant on uterus and/or Fallopian tubes.

Stage IIB

Extension to other pelvic intraperitoneal tissues.

Recurrent ovarian cancer

This means that the disease went away with treatment but then came back (recurred).

Stage III

Tumor involves 1 or both ovaries with cytologically or histologically confirmed spread to the peritoneum outside the pelvis and/or metastasis to the retroperitoneal lymph nodes.

Stage IIIA1

Positive retroperitoneal lymph nodes only.

Stage IIIA2

Microscopic, extrapelvic (above the brim) peritoneal involvement ± positive retroperitoneal lymph nodes.

Macroscopic, extrapelvic, peritoneal metastasis (<) less

Ovarian Cancer Cell Types

"Epithelial

About 90% of ovarian cancers start in the epithelium tissue, which is the lining on the outside of the ovary. This type of ovarian cancer is divided into serous, mucinous, endometrioid, clear cell, transitional and undifferentiated types. The risk of epithelial ovarian cancer increases with age, especially after the age of 50.

Germ cell

Germ cell tumors account for about 5% of ovarian cancers. They begin in the egg-producing cells. This type of ovarian cancer can occur in women of any age, but about 80% are found in women under the age of 30. The main subtypes are teratoma, dysgerminoma, endodermal sinus tumor and choriocarcinoma.

Sex cord stromal

These tumors, about 5% of ovarian cancers, grow in the connective tissue that holds the ovary together and makes estrogen and progesterone. Most are found in older women, but sometimes they occur in girls. Sex cord stromal tumors usually do not spread as fast as other ovarian tumors. Subtypes include **granulosa**, **granulosa-theca and Sertoli-Leydig cell tumors**.

Primary peritoneal carcinoma

This is a more rare cancer. It has cells like those on the outside of the ovaries, but it starts in the lining of the pelvis and abdomen. Women can get this type of cancer even after their ovaries have been removed. Symptoms and treatment are similar to ovarian cancer."

CA-125 Blood Test

A CA-125 blood test is generally taken before surgery to determine initial levels.

"A CA 125 test measures the amount of the protein CA 125 (cancer antigen 125) in your blood.

Many different conditions can cause an increase in CA 125. These conditions include uterine fibroids, endometriosis, pelvic inflammatory disease and cirrhosis, as well as pregnancy and normal menstruation. Certain cancers, including ovarian, endometrial, peritoneal and fallopian tube, also can cause CA 125 to be released into the bloodstream.

A CA 125 test isn't accurate enough to use for cancer screening in all women — especially premenopausal women — because many benign conditions can increase the CA 125 level. What's more, CA 125 levels are normal in many women with early-stage ovarian cancer."

HE4 Blood Test

"HE4 is a secondary blood test that can be combined with a CA-125 and statistical calculation for more precise information. For women in whom the CA-125 blood test is not a good marker, it is possible to use the HE4 test for useful clinical data."

Chemotherapy

STANDARD CHEMOTHERAPY PROTOCOLS

In most cases, the first line of chemotherapy an oncologist will prescribe for ovarian cancer is a combination of <u>carboplatin and taxol</u> drugs, or a similar variation. In addition, a research drug may be added. There are generally two methods of delivery for the chemo drugs, and while one or the other is usually employed, some doctors prescribe both methods during a course of chemo: 1) Intravenous, or IV, delivery through a vein; and 2) Intraperitoneal, or IP, direct delivery through a port into the peritoneal cavity.

CHEMO PORT & I.P. PORT

It is quite common to undergo minor surgery to have a port placed under the skin in the clavicle area for IV chemotherapy. The port helps to keep veins in the arm viable and makes it easier for chemo nurses to administer drugs and take blood samples. An intraperitoneal or "IP" port may also be placed in the abdominal area when the doctor chooses this additional course of delivery.

LOW BLOOD CELL COUNTS

It may happen that during chemo, your white & red blood cells and platelet counts will drop below normal. This is generally treated with medication, transfusions or delaying chemo.

"CHEMO BRAIN"

"This is the common term for a cognitive condition of foggy thinking, memory impairment and cognitive disorganization that may occur during or after chemotherapy treatment. While there is no definitive research proving "chemo brain" is a side-effect of chemo, many people experience the condition."

Tumor Assays: Surgery Preparation

/t is possible to send a sample of tumor tissue to a lab and have it tested to determine sensitivity to various chemotherapy agents. In order for this to occur, the sample has to be taken at the time of surgery, kept fresh and shipped directly to the lab. As such, the decision to pursue this approach has to be made before surgery. The results provide important information with regard to choice of chemotherapy.

Rational Therapeutics is a lab that does this testing and has been used by women in Nicki's Circle.

Tips from a Survivor

Tips from Jeanene Smith, COCA Associate Director and 15-yr. ovarian cancer survivor

PRE-SURGERY / PRE-CHEMO TIPS

- Set up a phone tree of people who need to know how you are doing and/or can lend support. You can also utilize a service such as www.MyLifeLine.org (see page 20) to keep people informed of how you are doing without having to make a multitude of calls when your energy is low.
- Plan ahead! Before you have surgery or chemo, take care of things that you might not have the energy to do after chemo begins:
 - Take your children and/or pets in for check ups
 - Get your car serviced
 - Go to the dentist BEFORE you begin chemo. Most doctors will advise AGAINST going to the dentist while you are in chemo due to the risk of infection.
 - Get a pedicure (and manicure!) BEFORE chemo begins.
 - Stock your pantry and refrigerator with easy to prepare food and snacks.
 - Consider buying items that are a bit more bland. Your tastebuds may change during chemo.
 - Cook a few meals ahead (or ask your family and friends to help) for the freezer.
 There will be days you don't feel like cooking.
 - O Purchase any heavy or bulky items (pet food, paper products, etc.)
 - Make it easy on yourself and buy a big pill box to help manage any medications that you might be given to combat side effects.
- Consider purchasing (or borrowing) a comfortable reclining chair—very beneficial as you recover from surgery and go through chemo.
- Make sure caregivers have keys to your home.
- Make a checklist of bills you regularly pay and when they are due so that you don't miss
 making any payments.

POST-SURGERY AND DURING CHEMO TIPS

- Doctors visits:
 - ^o Write any questions down in advance of your appointment.
 - Always take someone with you to take notes and ask questions that you might forget.
 - On't be afraid to question your doctor (it is your health, your life, and you are the customer) but remember, your doctor is your best ally.
 - o It's OK to seek a second opinion.
- Keep Medical Records
 - Onsider keeping a 3-ring binder to house your doctor visit notes, questions for the doctor, blood test results, CT Scan reports, and a journal where you track daily how you are feeling physically and emotionally.
- Listen to your body:
 - If you're tired, rest.
 - o If you are in pain, report it to your doctor. Do NOT try to tough it out. If you are in pain, you cannot heal.
 - If you are nauseous, ask your doctor for medicatiaons to help, and take those medications at the very first sign of nausea.
- Watch for patterns: Many women experience a pattern of side-effects as they move through each round of chemo. Keep a daily journal of how you are feeling physically and mentally. If you can determine a pattern of when you feel side-effects, then you'll be able to anticipate and deal with them. Here are a few tips:
 - Constipation and Diarrhea talk to your doctor about incorporating a stool softener, laxative, or anti-diarrheal medicine into your daily routine. A simple stool softener or anti-diarrheal pill once a day can make all the difference.
 - Fatigue Keep track of your lowest days and plan to rest as much as possible.
 Don't push yourself. Your body is fighting a battle and it needs rest.
 - Feeling good days You WILL have days when you feel good, typically right before your next treatment. Use these days for housecleaning, errand running, and preparing for your next round of chemotherapy.
 - Depression Chemotherapy can effect brain chemistry. It's a smart move to talk to your doctor about an anti-depressant or anti-anxiety medicine and start it sooner rather than later in your treatment cycle.
 - Bad days If you notice days during your treatment cycle that are worse than others (emotionally and/or physically), ask someone to stay with you on those days to help.
- You might notice that regular eating utensils taste awful and leave a metallic taste in your mouth. Using plastic utensils helps.
- Welcome the assistance from family, friends, neighbors and professionals. You do NOT get extra points for toughing it out. People want to help but don't know how to help. Give them an opportunity to show you that they care. Ask for help.
- Attend a support group. You'll learn so many tips for combating side effects, managing treatment, and coping.

Make a Belly Buddy

 ${\mathcal A}$ bdominal surgery might leave you feeling like you need a little extra support! Make a "Belly Buddy" to hold against your tummy when you are getting up and down from a chair or bed. You'll need a thin bath-sized towel and duct tape. (1) Fold the towel in thirds lengthwise; (2) Now fold it in fourths; (3) Wrap the duct tape around the folded towel lengthwise - be generous with the tape; (4) Wrap the duct tape around the towel in the other direction. You should now have a fairly firm but slightly flexible pillow of sorts to hold against your tummy!

KEEPING MEDICAL RECORDS

H is important that you keep your own records and notes about the progress of your care. This will be very helpful if you decide to engage in a clinical trial or change doctors. Items to include are:

- Copies of your CT & PET scans
- Ongoing CA-125 test results
- Types and duration of chemo drugs
- Any side effects experienced
- Additional opinions or referral visits
- Any supplements or complementary care utilized

It's also helpful to keep a document current with all your important medical history such as:

- Primary Care Physician contact info
- Insurance company contact info
- · Current medications
- Allergic Reactions
- Chronic Illnesses
- Previous Illnesses
- Previous surgeries
 & accidents
- Family History
- Social History (addictions, smoking, etc.)
- Lifestyle History (exercise, diet)
- Administration (living will, health care proxy, pharmacy, etc.)

Hair Loss with Chemo



Taxol (paclitaxel) is the first-line chemotherapy drug generally given for ovarian cancer that causes sudden hair loss. Other chemotherapy drug agents may cause hair loss or thinning. Many women choose to shave their heads before chemo begins. Others choose to cut their hair very short. And others want to hold on to what they have for as long as they can. There is no right answer. Only you know what is right for you. Based on your treatment protocol, your doctor can give you an idea of when hair loss is expected to happen. When that time arrives, wear a shower cap or tight fitting cap to bed so you don't end up with hair all over your pillow in the morning. Take a brush or comb into the shower each day and gently comb or brush your hair as you rinse it. Also take a plastic bag into the shower with you for holding the hair that does fall out. Celebrate when treatment is over and your fuzzy hair appears! Remember – you will likely lose your eyebrows and eyelashes as well. Take in a "Look Good, Feel Better" class sponsored by the American Cancer Society to learn tips for making the most of what you've got. You'll be surprised at how GREAT you can look!

CLINICAL TRIAL PHASES

Phase 0 - Exploratory study involving very limited human exposure to the drug, with no therapeutic or diagnostic goals (for example, screening studies, microdose studies).

Phase 1 - Studies that are usually conducted with healthy volunteers and that emphasize safety. The goal is to find out what the drug's most frequent and serious adverse events are and, often, how the drug is metabolized and excreted.

Phase 2 - Studies that gather preliminary data on effectiveness (whether the drug works in people who have a certain disease or condition). For example, participants receiving the drug may be compared with similar participants receiving a different treatment, usually an inactive substance (called a placebo) or a different drug. Safety continues to be evaluated, and short-term adverse events are studied.

Phase 3-Studies that gather more information about safety and effectiveness by studying different populations and different dosages and by using the drug in combination with other drugs.

Phase 4 - Studies occurring after the FDA has approved a drug for marketing. These including postmarket requirement and commitment studies that are required of or agreed to by the sponsor. These studies gather additional information about a drug's safety, efficacy, or optimal use.

Clinical Trials and Ovarian Cancer



CLINICAL RESEARCH CHEMOTHERAPY DRUG STUDIES

Clinical trials or clinical research studies involve testing the effectiveness of new drugs for cancer (and other illnesses) on human subjects. Participating in a clinical trial helps to further the field of cancer treatment and provides patients the opportunity to try medications that might be effective against their disease.

For ovarian cancer patients, clinical trials can be an option at the beginning of treatment as well as later on in the event of recurrence. It is worth noting that many clinical trial protocols limit the number of rounds and types of chemotherapy previously taken.

University of Colorado Cancer Center Colorado's only National Cancer Institute (NCI)-Designated Cancer Center

"UCCC regularly conducts clinical trials locally for ovarian cancer patients. They offer Phase 1 through Phase 4 trials, and are the only place in the Rocky Mountain region that offers Phase I trials. At University of Colorado Hospital and the University of Colorado Cancer Center, clinical trials are conducted by individual departments. Their physicians are the scientists who lead the latest research and often apply new discoveries to their own patient care. As practicing physicians, their informed input on a clinical trial leads to more efficient, practical research designed with patients in mind. The CU Cancer Center's research trials are often available at more than one hospital. Genetic Risk Factors & Testing



HBOC SYNDROME

"Approximately 11% to 15% of ovarian cancers have genetic causes. As with breast cancer, the majority of hereditary ovarian cancer is due to mutations in the BRCA1 or BRCA2 genes which are associated with Hereditary Breast and Ovarian Cancer (HBOC) syndrome, and an increase a woman's risk for ovarian, fallopian tube, and peritoneal cancers. Women with a BRCA1 or BRCA2 mutation have up to a 44% risk to develop ovarian cancer by 70. Genetic testing and counseling are the best ways to determine actual risk. After childbearing is complete, surgery to remove the ovaries is the most common preventive (risk-reducing) strategy."

LYNCH SYNDROME

"Lynch syndrome, also known as hereditary non-polyposis colorectal cancer (HNPCC), is a type of inherited cancer of the digestive tract. People who have Lynch syndrome have a significantly increased risk of developing colorectal cancer and an increased risk of developing other types of cancers such as endometrial (uterine), stomach, breast, ovarian, small bowel (intestinal), pancreatic, urinary tract, liver, kidney, and bile duct cancers."

MANAGING NEUROPATHY

"Peripheral neuropathy, a side effect of certain chemotherapy drugs, causes numbness, pain and tingling in the hands and feet. The exact mechanism of this chemotherapy-induced neuropathy is unknown. Supplementation may help alleviate symptoms of neuropathy.

VITAMIN B6 - is known to help diabetic neuropathy and may help manage chemotherapy-induced neuropathy symptoms when taken in a safe dose. Taking 50 to 100 mg of B6 daily is safe and may be effective. If you are taking a multivitamin and/or B Complex, check the amount of B6 so that you do not go above 100 mg total per day.

GLUTAMINE-has been suggested to help chemotherapy-induced neuropathy, especially from Taxol. Taking 30g/day, as 15 grams twice daily, of Pure L-Glutamine Powder is considered safe for cancer patients. Try to find a powder without other "fillers" in the ingredient list.

ALPHA-LIPOIC ACID (ALA) -

seems to reduce symptoms of peripheral neuropathy in diabetic patients, and may help with symptoms of chemotherapyinduced neuropathy. Taking 300 mg twice daily or 600 mg daily is considered a safe dose. Symptom improvement is seen within 3-5 weeks. ALA is an antioxidant, and when used in combination with radiation treatment, may reduce effectiveness of the cancer therapy. ALA can be used for up to 4 weeks safely. For long-term use, speak with your physician and dietitian.

ACCUPUNCTURE - is an alternative therapy to oral supplementation. Emerging evidence supports acupuncture as effective in reducing chronic pain associated with cancer.

When considering supplementation, it is important to meet with a Registered Dietitian for an individualized dietary supplement plan."

What Does "Survivorship" Mean?

"Survivorship' means different things to different people. The National Cancer Institute's booklet, *Facing Forward: Life After Cancer Treatment*, defines a 'cancer survivor' in the following way: 'The term cancer survivor includes anyone who has been diagnosed with cancer, from the time of diagnosis through the rest of his or her life.' Many other organizations consider 'Cancer Survivors' to be: 'People affected by the diagnosis, including family members, friends, and caregivers' (www.cdc.gov/cancer/survivorship). You may not personally relate to the term 'cancer survivor'—maybe 'warrior' is more your speed, or nothing at all—but many use the term 'survivor' to describe those who take an active and positive role in their own care. The fact is: the number of cancer survivors in this country is steadily climbing thanks to better diagnostic tools and treatments. There are now over 12 million cancer survivors living in the United States. That's more than the population of New York City!"

A New Normal



While it is normal to look forward to the day when chemotherapy ends and life goes back to normal, it can often be a bumpy time of transition and readjustment. During surgery and chemo when the focus is on survival, your healthcare team, friends and family are generally right there for you. Once your treatment ends, however, the focus dissipates while the trauma and grief of the experience may come forward to finally be processed. This is a phenomenon now understood by cancer experts, who suggest developing a "Survivorship Care Plan" that includes pro-active ways to move forward after treatment.

Managing Fear, Anxiety, Depression & Grief



MANAGING FEAR, ANXIETY, DEPRESSION, GRIEF

"Some patients living with cancer have a low level of distress and others have higher levels of distress. The level of distress ranges from being able to adjust to living with cancer to having a serious mental health problem, such as major depression. However, most patients with cancer do not have signs or symptoms of any specific mental health problem. This summary describes the less severe levels of distress in patients living with cancer, including:

- Normal adjustment—A condition in which a person makes changes in his or her life to manage a stressful event such as a cancer diagnosis. In normal adjustment, a person learns to cope well with emotional distress and solve problems related to cancer.
- <u>Psychological and social distress</u>—A condition in which a person has some trouble making changes in his or her life to manage a stressful event such as a cancer diagnosis. Help from a professional to learn new coping skills may be needed.
- Adjustment disorder —A condition in which a person has a lot of trouble making changes in his or her life to manage a stressful event such as a cancer diagnosis. Symptoms such as depression, anxiety, or other emotional, social, or behavioral problems occur and worsen the person's quality of life. Medicine and help from a professional to make these changes may be needed.

Anxiety disorder—A condition in which a person has a lot of anxiety from a stressful event such as a cancer diagnosis. The anxiety affects his or her ability to manage emotions, social relationships, and work life. Medicine and help from a professional to manage the anxiety may be needed."

In Case of Recurrence

One of the realities of ovarian cancer is the concern of recurrence. While it is best not to live with continual anxiety about the possibility, it is wise to have a plan in case it happens. If ovarian cancer does recur, it can be helpful to have a "molecular profile" of the tumor done in order to see what overall genetic mutations are present (this is in addition to the BRCA genetic testing that may have been done to determine family inheritance). This is also a time to consider clinical trials, before the use of more chemo reduces the opportunity to join a study (see page 15).

Survivors Teaching Students: Saving Women's Lives®

"Through the Ovarian Cancer National Alliance's innovative educational program, Survivors Teaching Students: Saving Women's Lives", future health professionals — physicians, nurse practitioners, nurses and physician assistants — increase their understanding of ovarian cancer symptoms and risk factors so that they will be able to diagnose the disease when it is in its earlier, most treatable stages. Survivors Teaching Students" brings ovarian cancer survivors into health professionals' classrooms to share their stories and key information about the disease. The program has grown to include 92 medical schools around the country as well as 45 nurse practitioner, nursing and physician assistant training programs and schools. During each free one-hour presentation:

- Several ovarian cancer survivors, many of whom were diagnosed at an advanced stage, put a face and voice to the disease and tell their stories to illustrate the difficulty of early diagnosis and the resulting extended and recurring treatment.
- Students gain insights into listening to patient concerns and become sensitized to the psychosocial aspects of ovarian cancer as well as the need for early detection.
- Survivors and students directly interact to enhance the students' learning.

PALLIATIVE CARE Pain & Symptom Management

If you find that you are dealing with pain and uncomfortable symptoms in the course of dealing with ovarian cancer, palliative care is highly recommended. While palliative care is focused on relieving pain and managing symtoms - including nausea, difficulty sleeping, constipation, nutrition issues, etc. - it provides additional support in cooperation with those who are medically treating the disease. A team - including a palliative care physician, nurses, certified nurses' aides, social worker and chaplain - is assigned to you and provides a spectrum of physical, emotional and spiritual care. Once the pain and symptoms are under control, the care may be less frequent or discontinued altogether. Check with your doctor about recommendations for palliative care.

End of Life

HOSPICE CARE

In the course of dealing with recurrent ovarian cancer there may be a point where tough decisions will need to be made. If you know that your quality of life is no longer what you wish it to be, hospice care can be started once the decision is made not to pursue any further medical treatment. It is highly suggested that a hospice team be called in sooner than later, as they offer compassionate care for both the patient and the family during the transitional time before death. The hospice team is similar to a palliative care team - including a palliative care physician, nurses, certified nurses' aids, social worker and chaplain - and can be tremendously supportive through the entire process. It can also be the case that one "graduates" from hospice if the progression of disease stops and quality of life is resumed.
